Also, saints help us understand our Church history. We are all called to be saints. We need to learn about saints so we know who we are meant to be. Priests Study Day - The Priests of the Diocese of Peterborough will participate in their annual Study Days this week (November 17-18). Dan Cellucci, C.E.O. of the Catholic Leadership Institute is the facilitator. Dan is a well-known speaker in the United States and Canada and has given talks and seminars to bishops, priests, and lay leaders in many different settings. His talks will focus on helping our priests to face pastoral challenges and opportunities as we come through the pandemic and move beyond it. Please pray for our priests as they gather for some learning and inspiration this Wednesday and Thursday.

End Times - “What can we expect during the end times? No one knows the day or hour that Jesus will come again, the second coming is a mystery to everyone. We should be preparing each day for the coming of Christ. Prayer, examination of conscience, frequent reception of the sacraments, reading scripture, all of these things help us to prepare for the end of time. The Great Warning is not something to be feared, we will see our sinfulness before God and then work on purifying ourselves, this is something we should be doing each day.”

Synod of Synod of Bishop Survey- In preparation for the next Synod of Bishops, there will be a worldwide conversation in the Church about community, engaged participation, and the mission of evangelization. This conversation will follow a two-year path and involve the People of God - everyone, everywhere. To open the conversations, a survey is launched inviting the input of all the People of God. This input will be part of both the worldwide and local conversations to establish pastoral priorities within the Church. Your participation in the conversation is important. This is an opportunity to express ourselves, to be heard and to contribute to how the People of God can better journey together. *Copies of the Survey are available at the church entrance. Pope Francis (Opportunity for conversion) “The pandemic has been a revelation to us all about the limitations and shortcomings of our societies and lifestyles. And yet, in the midst of this shadowy reality, we need to hope. The Christian tradition, particularly the social doctrine of the Church, as well as other religious traditions, can help to give the reliable hope that injustice and violence are not inevitable, are not our destiny. Faced with a pandemic which has “shaken the world,” our conscience calls us to a path of hope that is not comfortable with returning to a “normality” marked by injustice, “but to accept the challenge of taking on the crisis as a ‘concrete opportunity for conversion, for transformation, for rethinking our way of life and our economic and social systems. Let us not waste this opportunity to improve our world.”

Visit of Pope Francis – “The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops released some more details this week about the delegation of Indigenous Elders, Knowledge keepers and Youth meeting with Pope Francis. The visit will take place from December 17 to 20, when Pope Francis will hear from First Nations, Metis and Inuit delegates about their experiences and the traumatic legacy of Indian Residential schools. Delegates will also have the opportunity to share their hopes and desires for Pope Francis’ visit to Canada, which was announced two weeks ago. Let us pray for the success of these meetings, an important step in the journey of reconciliation.”
