WHY DO WE COMMEMMORATE HOLY WEEK - Holy Week honors the week that changed the world. Holy Week is a time when Catholics gather to remember and participate in the Passion of Jesus Christ. The Passion is the greatest act of love in the history of mankind. Jesus sacrificed himself for the sake of each one of us. Romans 5:8 says, "God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us." Hope is what will sustain us in the days yet to come. The fears of this world cannot rob us of the hope that fills us-the hope of eternal life, which we will celebrate this Easter.

## New Church Sign Project

A big new sign will be erected by our own volunteers soon. It will be placed closer to the main intersection in front of the church so that it will be visible from all directions. Thank you to Gerry Scholz, member of the Parish Building Committee for his work in getting this project started. Donations from parishioners would be greatly appreciated to help defray the cost of the sign and materials estimated at \$1, 500. <u>PALM SUNDAY</u> – "Many Christians celebrate a holy event known as <u>Palm Sunday</u>. This event commemorates when Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, right before his death. Although the people cried "Save us, now" and greeted him with anxious expectation, by Friday, they would crucify him. And a week after he enters Jerusalem, he resurrects. Why did the people



wave palm branches and place them at the feet of Jesus' colt? Branches are a symbol of victory. The Jewish people wanted victory, victory over the Romans who had invaded their land. Jesus did come to enact a victory, but not quite the one they had in mind. When we use palm branches in our services, we can remember how Jesus had conquered death in order for us to have a chance to have salvation through him."

<u>SHARE LENT</u> - On the fifth Sunday of Lent, a collection takes place in all of the parishes across Canada to support the work of Development and Peace. The donations we make truly acquire life-giving power when they support collective actions aimed at eliminating the causes of poverty and bringing about social justice. Addressing the 'Minerva Dialogues,' a high-level annual gathering of scientists and experts, from the world of technology – scientists, engineers, business leaders, lawyers and philosophers -and representatives of the Church – curial officials, theologians and ethicists – with the aim of studying and fostering greater awareness of the social and cultural impact of digital technologies, he said, "I am convinced that the development of artificial intelligence and machine learning has the potential to contribute in a positive way to the future of humanity. At the same time, I am certain that this potential will be realized only if there is a constant and consistent commitment on the part of those developing these technologies to act ethically and responsibly, working to ensure that technology remains human-centred, ethically grounded and directed toward the good." *More items at the back page of the Bulletin.*
