

INDIGENOUS RECONCILIATION FUND

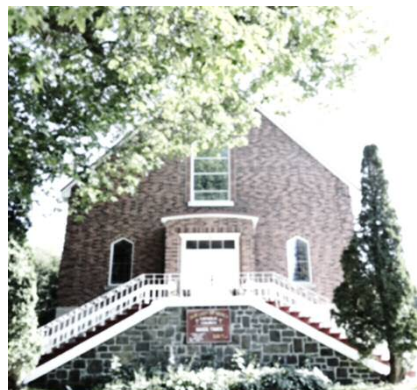
Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am pleased to provide this overview about the Indigenous Reconciliation Fund ("IRF") and the participation of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Peterborough. The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops at its September 2021 Plenary meeting announced a nation-wide collective financial commitment in the amount of \$30 million dollars to support healing and reconciliation initiatives for residential school survivors, their families, and their communities. The IRF serves as a tangible expression of the commitment to engage in truth, reconciliation, and healing with Indigenous Peoples and to address the trauma Indigenous Peoples experienced and continue to experience to this day due to the Residential Schools Policy. Each Diocese across Canada has pledged a sum of money to ensure that the national financial commitment will be met. The Roman Catholic Diocese of Peterborough was asked and has agreed to pledge the sum of \$400, 000. The funds will be overseen by a local committee comprised of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit ("FNMI") representation and used for these purposes: • Healing and reconciliation for communities and families; • Culture and language revitalization; • Education and community building; and • Dialogues for promoting indigenous spirituality and culture. The Diocese is engaging with the Indigenous Peoples residing here and establishing the local IRF Committee to oversee the collection and disbursement of funds in partnership with the national IRF Committee. The Bishop's Appeal in 2022 on July 3rd and 10th will be ear-marked for the Indigenous Reconciliation Fund and additionally, there will be two other collections in 2023 allocated for the IRF. The Diocese of Peterborough supports the CCCB effort to promote healing and reconciliation with our Indigenous sisters and brothers. With Jesus Christ as our model, the Church stands with those who suffer, those who mourn, and those who hunger for righteousness. May God bless our journey toward healing and reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples. *Yours in Christ,*

BISHOP DANIEL MIEHM ANNOUNCEMENTS

***THE VATICAN FORMALLY ANNOUNCED** that Pope Francis will visit Canada from July 24 to 29, for a journey focused on healing and reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. The three hub cities for the visit will be Edmonton, Quebec and Iqaluit. These communities will serve as the centers for the papal visit, allowing the Holy Father to focus his travel while providing opportunities for encounters both public and more personal.

CATHOLIC SAINTS WHO SUFFERED BRUTAL MARTYRDOM – *A Christian martyr is someone willing to face death rather than deny Jesus Christ or his Gospel. Beheading, stoning, crucifixion, and burning at stake were some of the horrific ways they were punished for their beliefs.* **SAN LORENZO RUIZ**- He and his companions left for Okinawa, Japan at the time when the Tokugawa shogunate was persecuting Christians. The missionaries were arrested and thrown into prison, and later to face trial by torture. He was hung upside down in a pit by his tormentors until he suffocated to death in Nagasaki, Japan. Ruiz was subjected to water torture. Needles were inserted through his finger nails and was beaten until unconsciousness. Despite the torture inflicted on him, Ruiz did not renounce his Christian faith. His last words were, "I am a Catholic and wholeheartedly do accept death for God. Had I a thousand lives, all these to Him I shall offer". San Lorenzo Ruiz was canonized by Pope John Paul II in the Vatican City, Rome on October 18, 1987, making him the first Filipino saint and the first Filipino martyr.
