POPE FRANCIS - "Every day God passes by and sows a seed in the soil of our lives. Making that seed grow depends on us, on our prayer, on the open heart with which we approach the Scriptures so that it might become for us the Living Word of God."

BISHOP'S APPEAL - The Bishop's Appeal for 2022 took place last Sunday, July 3 and today Sunday, July 10. This appeal has been designated for the Indigenous Reconciliation Fund. Dioceses across Canada are joining this financial pledge and the Diocese of Peterborough will be contributing \$400 000. The funds will be overseen by a local committee comprised of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit ("FNMI") representation and used for these purposes: Healing and reconciliation for communities and families; Culture and language revitalization; Education and community building; and Dialogues for promoting indigenous spirituality and culture. VATICAN CARDINALS LAUD U.S. SUPREME COURT — Several senior Vatican prelates have praised the June 24 Supreme Court decision overturning *Roe v. Wade*, saying that the historic decision is "just reward" for persistent efforts to protect defenseless human life, and urging the faithful to continue to defend the unborn in the public square. "Thanks be to God, the fundamentally unjust Supreme Court decision in *Roe v. Wade* has been overturned," said U.S. Cardinal Raymond Burke. "It is a victory that's the fruit of the perseverance of citizens in fulfilling their duty to safeguard and foster human life, especially the innocent and defenseless human life of the unborn", he said. Cardinal George Pell called the landmark decision "an important victory for life, human rights, and indeed the best traditions of our Western way of life. It is immensely encouraging to the forces for good, not just in the United States, but especially in the Anglophone world — and throughout the West. It is a just reward for nearly 50 years of wise and brave, prayerful and persistent, spiritual and political activity." Cardinal Kasper said, "If I am correctly informed, the U.S. Supreme Court decided that the American Constitution doesn't recognize a right to abortion. I would also like to add that, even more, the Gospel doesn't recognize such a right. Thus for us as Christians it is obligatory to engage ourselves in the protection of life."

MARTYR AND SAINTS - "In history, hundreds of early Christians have faced persecution for their faith. Some historians even believed that the Roman Catholic Church was born out of the martyrdom of its members. A Christian martyr is someone willing to face death rather than deny Jesus Christ or his Gospel. Throughout the ages and all across the world, individuals who have expressed an unwavering faith have suffered all kinds of unimaginable tortures. Those who suffered for their beliefs have always been venerated and have been regarded as inspirational examples for future generations. In Christianity, the people who suffered the most for their faith are now celebrated as saints. The reason that the Church honors the saints is not just to give them glory, but to hold them up as exemplars for imitation. Saint Thérèse wrote: "I love to read the lives of the saints very much. The account of their heroic deeds inflames my courage and spurs me on to imitate them."
